Brock Library forced to shed journal subscription costs

Interim University Librarian Barbara McDonald: "There's no way around it. We're making hard decisions."

Brock is becoming the latest university to cancel some of its academic journal subscriptions because their spiralling costs have become too expensive to sustain.

Effective Dec 31, Brock will cancel a major package of electronic subscriptions to 1,363 journals distributed by US-based Wiley-Blackwell, which is one of about a half-dozen major companies who control most of the world's academic publishing industry.

Open Access

What is Open Access (OA)?

Open Access (OA) typically refers to full-text scholarly research that is made freely available on the internet. In a scholarly environment, OA often focuses on journal literature.

MUGSI

Open Access: "Literature which is freely available on the public internet, permitting any users to read, download, copy, distribute, print, search, or link to the full texts of these articles, crawl them for indexing, pass them as data to software, or use them for any other lawful purpose, without financial, legal, or technical barriers other than those inseparable from gaining access to the internet itself. The only constraint on reproduction and distribution, and the only role for copyright in this domain, should be to give authors control over the integrity of their work and the right to be properly acknowledged and cited." (Budapest Open Access Initiative, 2001)

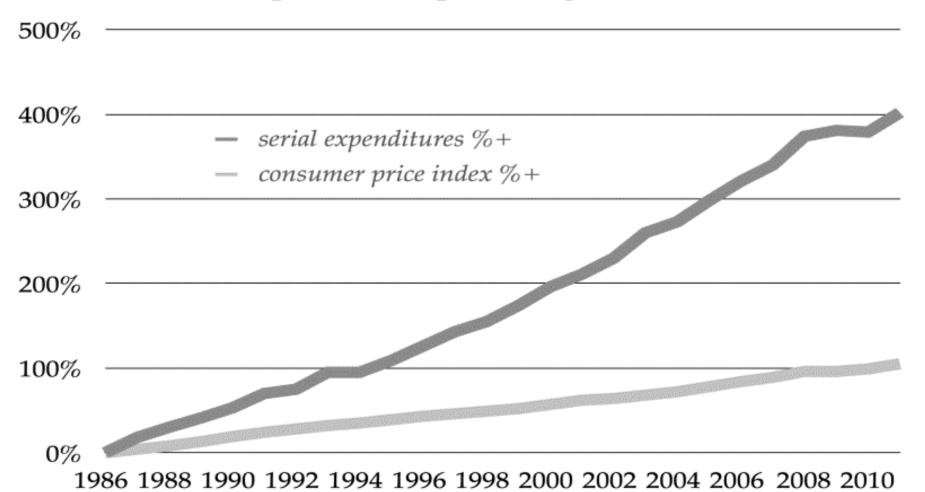

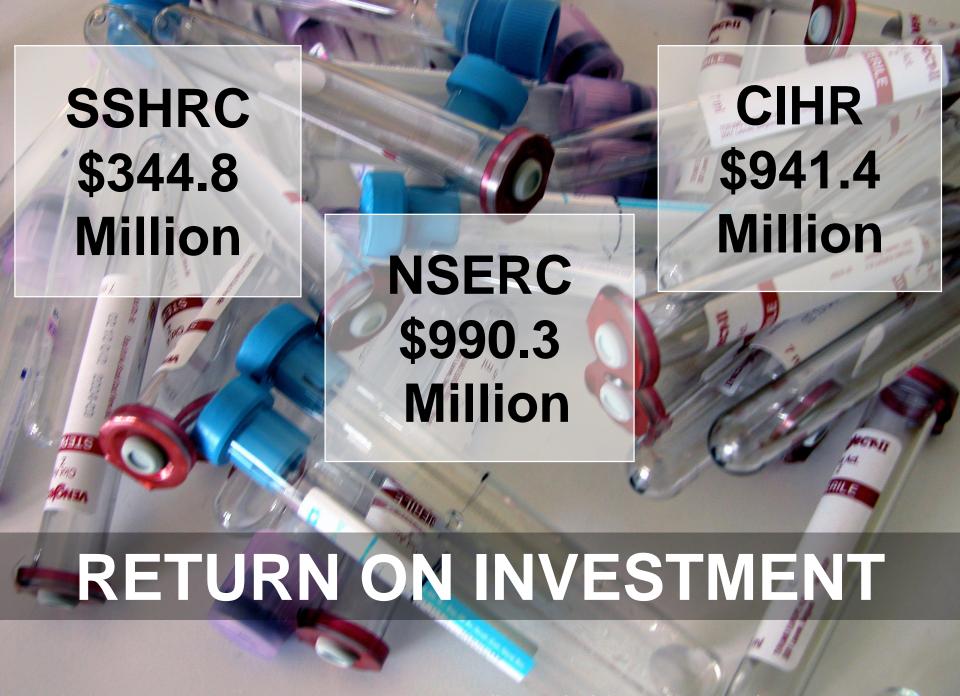

Serials expenditures percentage increase over 1986



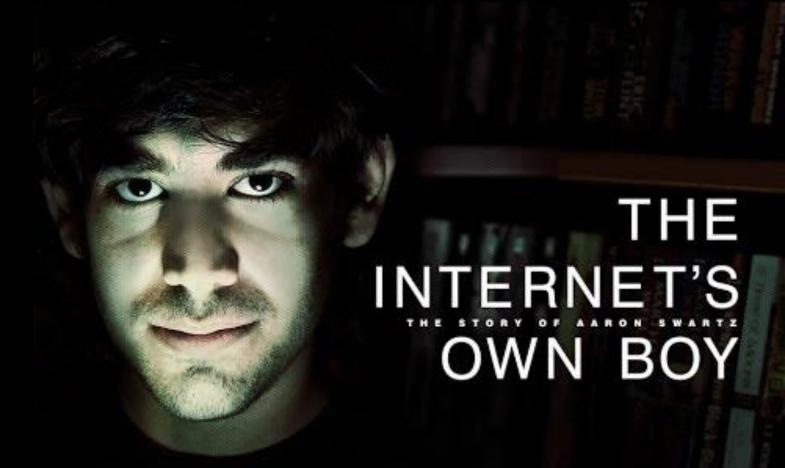

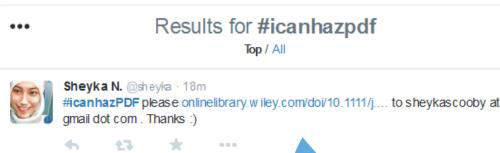

Since its start in May 1996, First Monday has published 1,439 papers in 225 issues; these papers were written by 1,983 different authors. First Monday is indexed in Communication Abstracts, Computer & Communications Security Abstracts, DoIS, eGranary Digital Library, INSPEC, Information Science & Technology Abstracts, LISA, PAIS, Scopus, and other services.

Ad hoc encounters with big data: Engaging citizens in conversations around tabletops
Interactive tabletops will allow users to explore data in familiar places such as living rooms, cafés, and public spaces. This paper builds upon current advances in sensing and organic user interfaces to propose how tabletops in the future could encourage collaboration and engage users in socially relevant data-oriented activities. This work suggests switching from fixed to mobile tabletops and provides two examples of hypothetical interface types: tabletiles and moldable displays. In turn, tabletops could foster future civic communities, expanding modes of participation.

Also this month Object, Me, Symbiote, Other: A social typology of player-avatar relationships



Despite how humans and non-human objects relate in very social ways, the relations between players and their online game avatars are most often examined through conspicuously parasocial lenses. That is, the player-avatar relationship (PAR) is generally seen as one-way and non-dialectical as players think, feel, and acts toward the avatar without consideration for the avatar's role in that relationship. This study examines the potential for PARs to be fully social, in which player and avatar both materially contribute to the relationship.

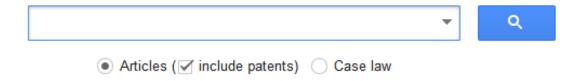

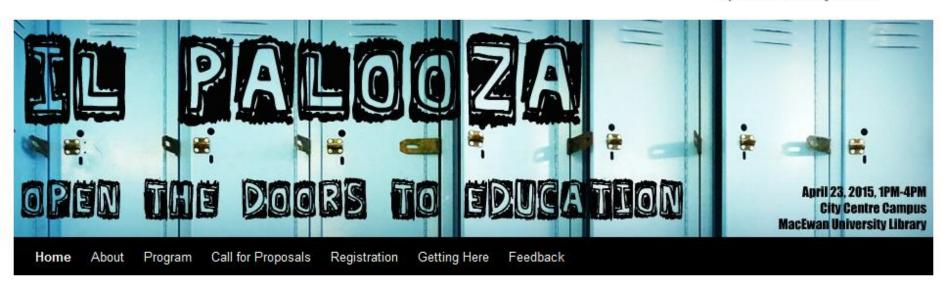
