
## EXPOSING UNDERGRADUATE RESEARCH IN INSTITUTIONAL REPOSITORIES

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Archiving exemplary works by undergraduate students in institutional repositories (IRs) can have a number of benefits:

- Providing permanent, searchable access to works
  for inclusion in CVs & graduate school applications.
- Promoting research opportunities.
  - Exposing students to open access self-archiving early in their academic careers.

To date, however, Canadian IR services engaged in such practices is low.
