WHAT ARE OER?



What are OER?

- One of many initiatives in Open Education
 - Open Access: free, immediate online availability of research articles
 - Open Data: data that can be freely used, re-used, and redistributed by anyone.
 - OER: teaching, learning, and research materials that are made freely available that you may use and re-use at little or no cost.



What are OER?

- Format goes beyond textbooks:
 - Lesson plans
 - Assessment tools
 - Videos
 - Software
 - Tutorials/Full Courses
 - Supplemental materials







What makes OER "Open"?

- Shared under an open license OR;
- In the Public Domain.
- Depending on the licensing, OER can be:
 - Retained
 - Reused
 - Revised
 - Remixed
 - Redistributed

WHY USE OER?



Why use OER?

- Increase timely access to materials
 - Issues ordering in/purchasing textbook
 - Accessibility e.g. screen reader compliant formats
- Flexibility to customize curriculum, update content
- Not bound to a specific textbook/publisher
- Universal Design for Learning (UDL)



Why use OER?



- Study on impact of textbook costs:
 - 67% did not purchase required text
 - 48% occasionally-frequently took fewer courses
 - 26% dropped a course
 - 21% withdrew from a course


